Introduction

This is the 2nd Annual Legislative Report 2025 of Hon. Johnson Samuel Nagbe Williams, Sr., Representative of Electoral District #3, River Gee County. The reporting period covers from October 1, 2024 to December 31, 2025, recording activities, events and happenings, including his statutory functions as a Lawmaker. In summary, the report captures activities and events which occurred during the second legislative session where he exercised his cardinal legislative functions of lawmaking, representation and oversight, as well as activities and events which occurred during the First Annual Legislative Report 2024 and constituency engagements in 14 communities across the District during the period under reporting. Following the 2024 reporting, a Mid-Term Review of the policy statements and commitments made was held from March 26-28, 2025 by Statutory District. During the review, progress were noted in the areas of land disputes resolution mechanisms, education, health and local government services. Specific progress to note are efforts employed in mediating land conflicts, a steady stability in the supply and availability of drugs and medical supplies in all clinics across the District, but highlighted challenges of poor infrastructures, volunteerisms, lack of mobility and operational logistics. Also, the official launch of the Sarah Tweh-Ayeneh Howard-Salbie Foundation, aka, (The Tweh-Ayene Foundation - TTF) was held on the day marking the 10th Death Anniversary of the honoree at the St. Theresa Cathedral in Harper City, Maryland County. TTF now provides education opportunities to deserving children and youth who are in need in Liberia and abroad, with high priority of 80% reserved for all beneficiaries and resources targeting River Gee Citizens.

Additionally, during the period under reporting, other programmes and projects were launched and implemented, including the emergency roads rehabilitation programme, launch of the sustainable farms-to-market roads rehabilitation, operationalization of the Land Disputes Resolution Mechanism Fund, District Market Women Micro Loan Scheme, Youth Empowerment Initiatives, and other community development initiatives.

In the last two (2) years, we have successfully initiated and launched over fifty (50) projects and interventions, eighteen (18) of which have been fully completed, 19 nearing completion while 13 are continuous or recurrent in nature annually.

	<p>(APNODE) in Casablanca, Morocco, from November 19-21, 2025, hosted by the House of Councillors of the of Moroccan Government.</p> <p>Proxied for the Honorable Speaker Richard Nagbe Koon at the courtesy call meetings with the Moroccan Delegation and the ECOWAS Community Court Delegation at the Capitol Building, Monrovia;</p> <p>Held fifty (54) constituency engagements, comprising of visits of individual and organizations, town halls in Monrovia and in the District on key matters regarding the following:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (a) Leadership crisis at the Honorable House of Representatives; (b) Government’s pronouncements of the purchase of 285 units of earth-moving equipment; and, (c) A midterm review of policy statements and policy commitments made by the Honorable Representative in September 2024 regarding <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – <i>ghost names on government’s payroll, volunteerism in the education, health and local government services;</i> – <i>the influx of the economic migrants of Burkinabes and manner and form by which farming activities are taking place;</i> – <i>the presence of cattle in the streets and along the main highways, from Nyaake to Sarbo Maiken; and,</i> – <i>emergency road works of cleaning, clearing and roadside brushing of feeder and farms-to-market roads linking borders routes and markets;</i>
<p>Oversight Responsibility</p>	<p>I wrote Plenary to request the appearance of the Minister of the Ministry of Transport (MOT), the Managing Director of the Liberia Water and Sewage Corporation (LWSC) and the Chairperson of the Liberia Anti-Corruption Commission (LACC) to address information in the public regarding bribery allegations involving the Honorable House of Representatives. The Minister and the Managing Director both appeared and testified under oath that the information was misleading and had no iota of truths.</p> <p>I wrote Plenary craving its indulgence to invite both the Telecom International Alliances (TIA) and Liberia Telecommunication Authority (LTA) over allege bribery allegations contract alterations of the Concession Agreement between the Government of Liberia and TIA. Liberian Journalist Sekou Sheriff made the grave allegations on his platform when he petitioned the 54th National Legislature in December 2023 alleging that Telecom International Alliances has altered its contract in a way that significantly extended its duration. These efforts also solidify my unflinching supports to ensuring that telecommunications services across Liberia improved and value for money is assured.</p> <p>I wrote Plenary craving its indulgence to discharge from Committee Room the Anti Homosexuality Bill, seeking to amend Chapter 14 subchapter D of the Penal Law of Liberia, which I drafted and submitted on the floor of Plenary in 2024.</p>

Allocation of the parcel of land and the transfer of landownership title has been duly completed. Hence, I remain committed to providing the materials while the community implements the construction of the Guesthouse, Webbo;</p>

	<p>Fulfilled my promises and established the Sarah Tweh-Ayene Howard-Salbie Foundation, aka (The Tweh-Ayene Foundation - TTF) which now provides education opportunities (Scholarships and Financial Aid) for 789 beneficiaries, costing about L\$4.524 million for academic year 2025/2026; TTF also provides medical services for people in need, with a combined total of 11 beneficiaries;</p> <p>Due to volunteer teachers’ threats to lay down chalk for academic year 2025/2026, I swiftly intervened and designed a Volunteer Teacher Compensation Programme which now caters to seventy-nine (79) volunteers across the two School Districts, costing L\$2.4 million;</p> <p>Launched a major sustainable farms-to-market roads rehabilitation programme in collaboration with the Ministry of Public Works in four (4) roads corridors comprising of nine (9) roads segments with a combined total of 110km of roads; Gbawleeken/Youworken, Youworken/Saykliken and Production Camp/U-bor Waterside, representing 46.89km road works ongoing.</p> <p>Procured and stocked pile assorted quantities of basic stationeries (papers, ledgers, ink pens, permanent markers, rulers, paper folders, box files, staple machines and pins, etc.) for the offices of the DEOs, DHOs, Joint Security Detachments and Local Government Administration; delivery pending.</p> <p>Procured, produced and stocked pile motorcycle gears (helmets and reflective jackets) to promote roads safety and protections of 200 youths who are domiciled within the District; delivery pending.</p> <p>I hired the consulting services of the Centre for Bridging the Educational Gaps in Liberia (CBEGL) and commissioned an assessment of some sample schools within the two school districts to determine the possibility of implementing a tutorial programme for academic year 2025/2026. However, the assessment reveals key findings: “90% of teachers have demonstrated no subject content and pedagogical knowledge in their areas of teaching, not to mention lesson planning while many students lack basic reading, writing, and comprehension skills”. Total cost of the assessment was L\$121,200;</p>
<p>Land Disputes Resolution Mechanism Programme</p>	<p>Disbursed over L\$200,000.00 our annual target to Electoral District #3 Elder Council and Local Government Administration for the conduct of hearings, investigations and adjudication of disputes on land matters. Total actual spending amounts to L\$340,000.00 to date.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (a) Disbursed L\$85,000.00 for the conduct of hearings and site investigations over land disputes between the People of Deabo Parken/Tugbaken and the People of Gyetu Yargbeken. All traditional impediments now removed, fines paid but survey of the contentious land area pending; (b) Disbursed L\$170,000.00 for the conduct of hearings, site investigations and fines imposed the County Elder Council on both tribes of Glarro and Kiteabo for the violent land disputes which led into the loss of lives and properties; (c) Disbursed L\$85,000.00 for the conduct of hearings and site investigations on a disputed parcel of land between the People of Webbo Gbawlaken and the People of Tuobo Gbawleeken; <p>Completed the drafting of a Standardized Contractual Framework Agreement and its translation into the French Language to be administered between the locals and the economic migrants of Burkinabes;</p> <p>Held three (3) official meetings with Ministry of Justice through the Liberia Immigration Service (LIS), Ministry of Labor (MOL) and the National Identification Registry (NIR) for the possibility to regularize the entry, residency and work statuses of the economic migrants of Burkinabes who have entered into verbal farming agreement with the locals;</p>

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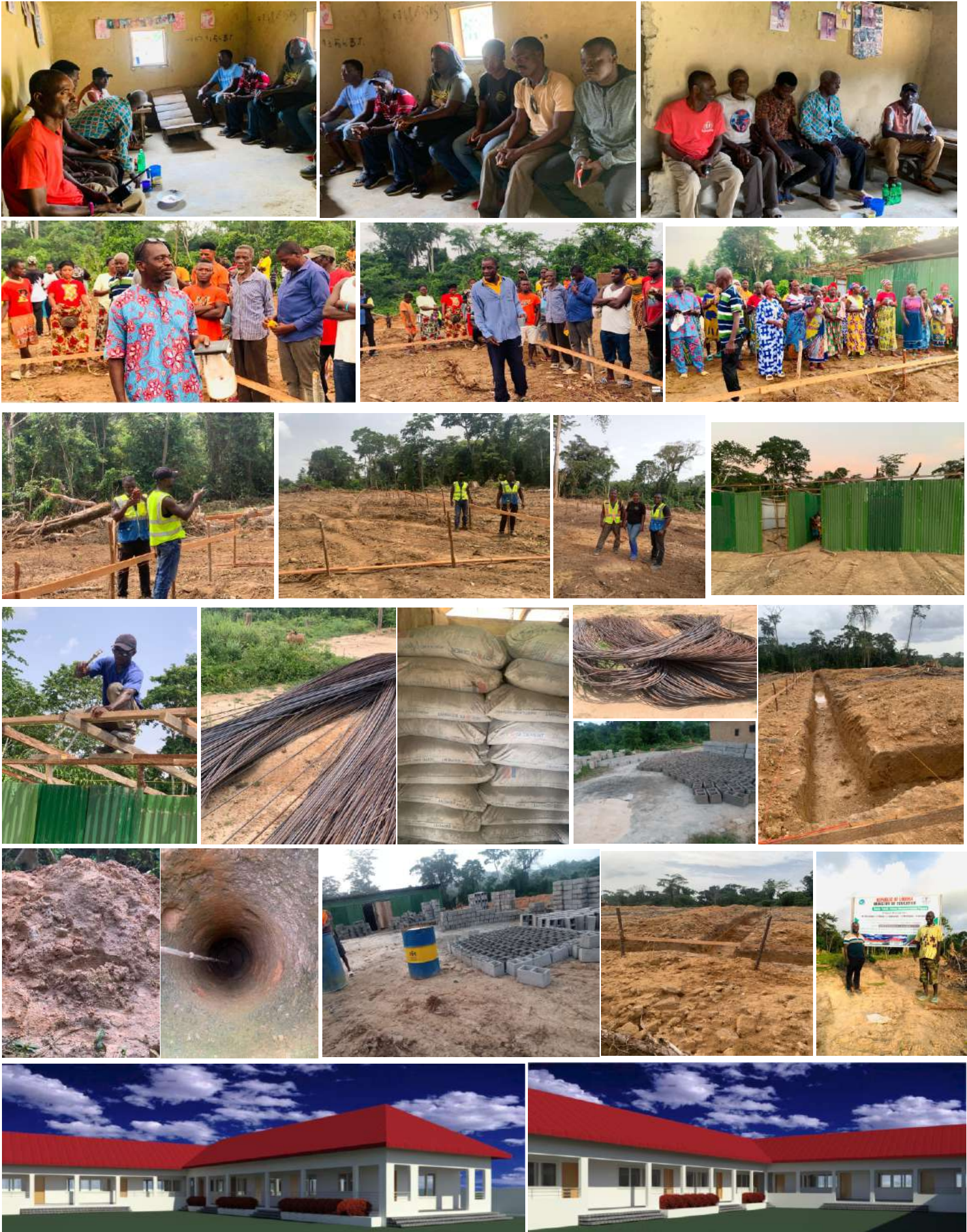
